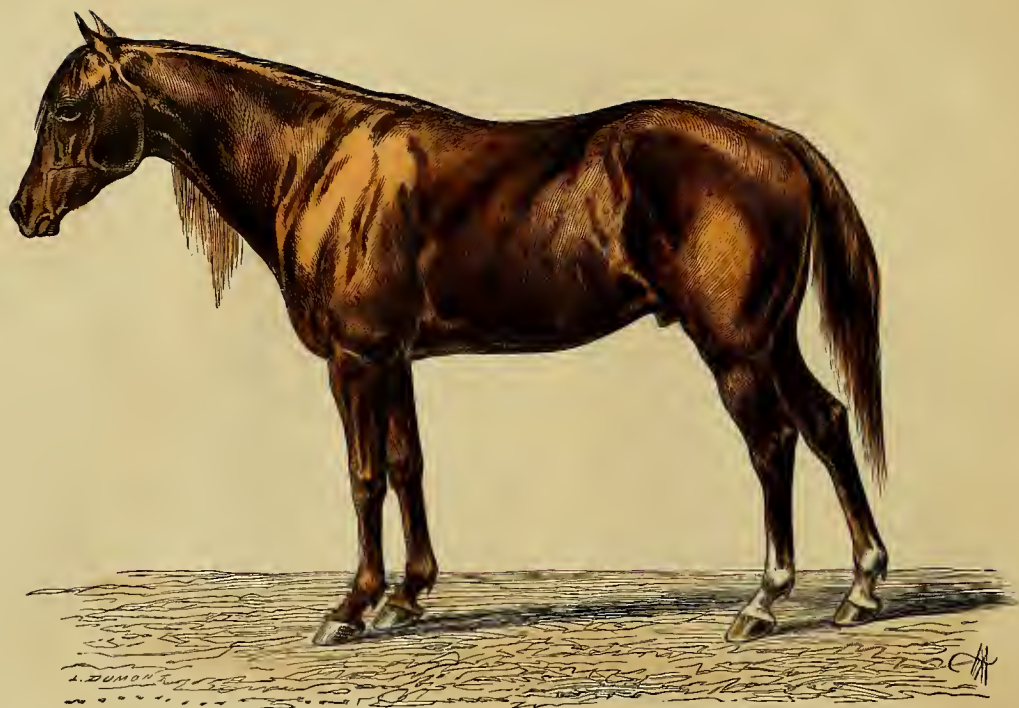

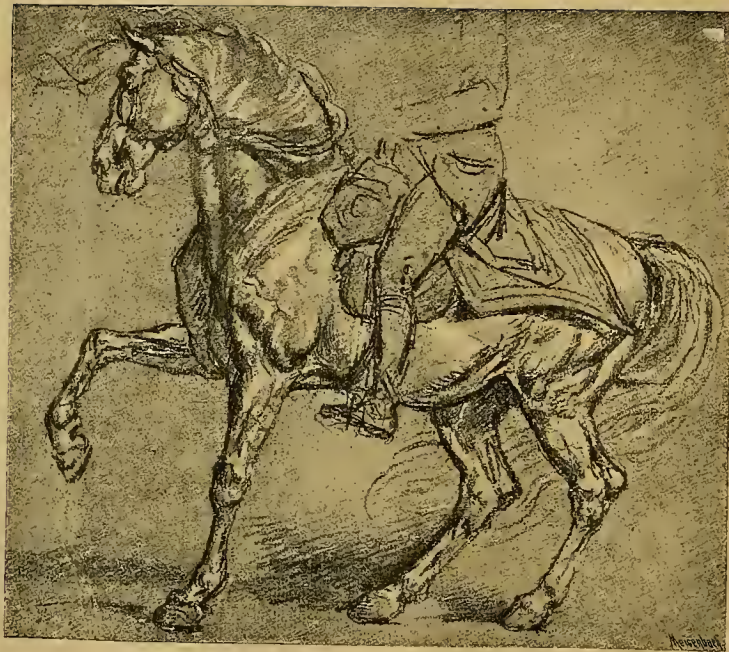

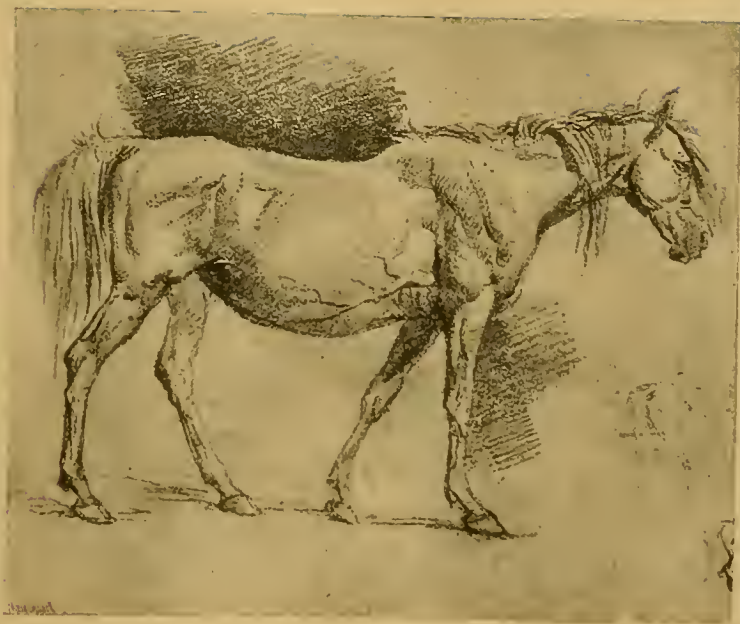

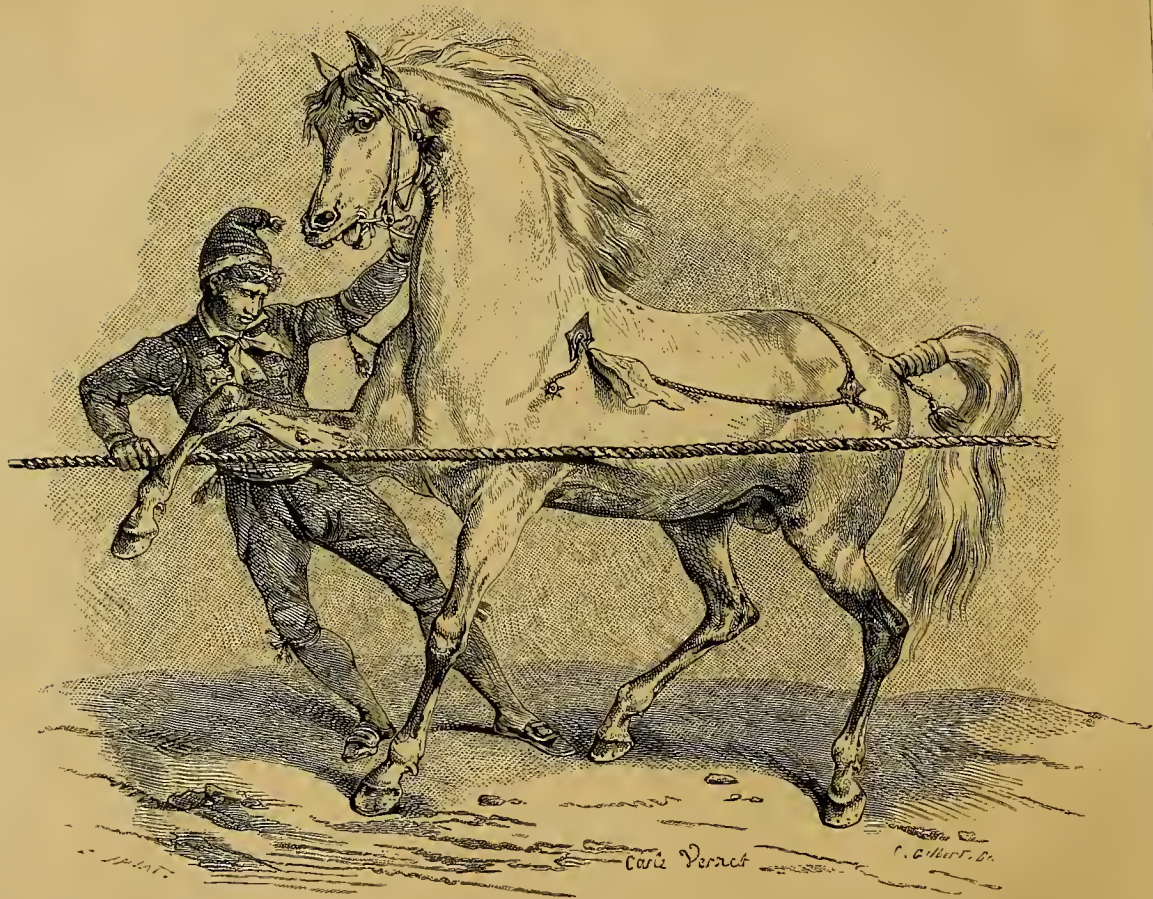

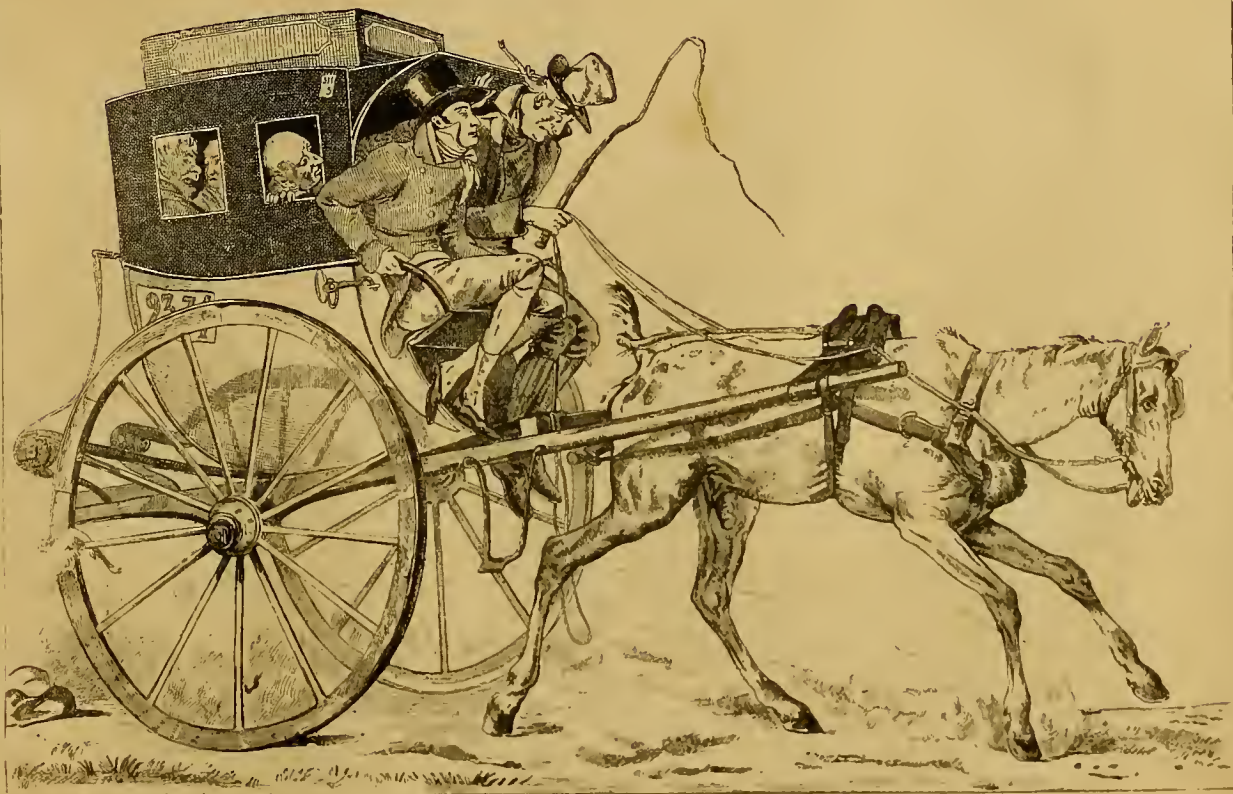

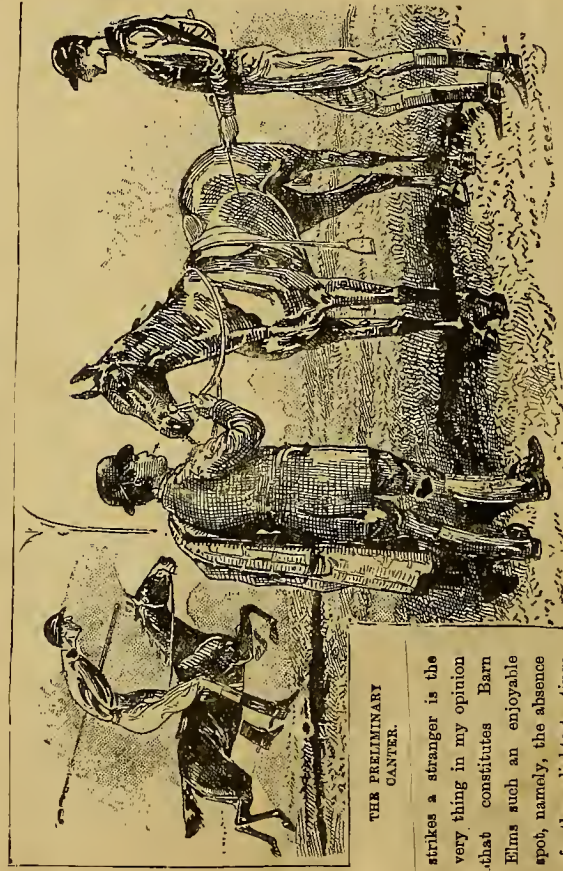


TYPICAL RIDERS.

name my Paper as well as to pay. I noticed that even the grooms were above the ordinary mark, so carefully is the whole system managed.

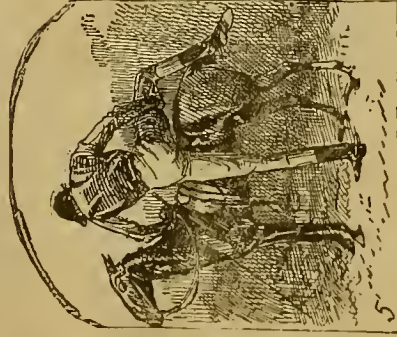
The grounds are of capital size and are arranged in a quite work-mike fashion. The club pavilion answers for the grand stand, and for the weighing room, &c. Then there is the Pari-Mutuel, and last, but not least, a long shed under which the ponies stand "till called for"—*suck* ponies, miniature racehorses, beautifully groomed of course and plaited. The riders can scarcely be called "jockeys" in the proper signification of the word, for not a few of them are "long" men, evidently carefully trained for the events, as their lithe limbs plainly show. Some people might dub my sketches, caricatures; they are not at all so. The idea conveyed to the mind when one sees the "correct card" is true in substance and in fact. The wonder is that the tiny animals can get along under their riders; but they do, at a clinking pace. I once saw a Polo pony race at Hurlingham, men and ponies, as in this case, beautifully dressed and trained, in which the men, when rounding the end of the course, by leaping to the rails in the swing of the pace brought their mounts down in a heap, merely by force of overbalancing. After that spill one poor fellow was carried away on a hurdle—unconscious. I hope he is alive and well. This is the only danger, and has to be risked. At Barn Elms they not only raced, but took hurdles—the ponies with eager faces evidently enjoying the fun. The details and results of the different events have been duly chronicled in the sporting papers pure and simple. I am merely a "penciler"

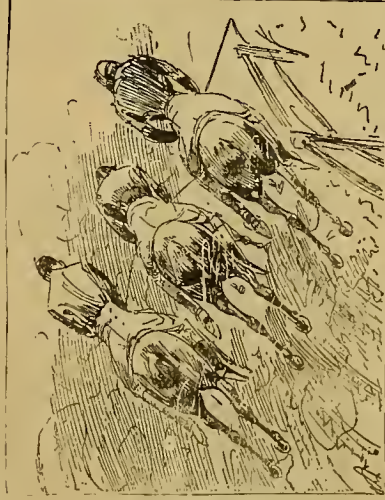
gain entrance by the introduction of a member, or (as was my case) on payment of half a sovereign; and even then—for it is well known
